

Executive Summary



In 2025, Memorial Health System (MHS), Dickinson County Health Department, and K-State Research and Extension collaborated to complete the Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) for the targeted service area, *Dickinson County, Kansas*. Creating healthy communities requires a level of mutual understanding, respect, and collaboration among community health leaders and community residents. The benefits of this important collaboration for the CHNA identify important key health priorities in the community, highlighting gaps in services, justifies resource allocation, and ultimately leads to better health outcomes.

The CHNA is a requirement for non-profit hospitals. Furthermore, the Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB) requires, in the accreditation process, that a public health department develop a set of standards to measure the performance of services performed by the health department. With that, a periodic community health assessment is required as well. The collaboration between MHS and the Dickinson County Health Department will help serve the needs of both entities that serve the health needs of Dickinson County.

The CHNA must take into account input from persons who represent the broad interest of the community served by the hospital. This includes those with special knowledge or expertise in public health and those representing low-income, medically underserved, or minority populations in the community.

This CHNA combines data from a variety of secondary sources, a community survey which provided feedback from the targeted service area, *Dickinson County*, and a focus group of 50 community members who came together in a town hall meeting on April 23, to review the compiled data, identifying the prominent needs of the community.

Five top priorities were identified among the focus group: mental health, chronic illness, substance abuse, physical health, and insurance. With these top five priorities identified, focus group members shared several ways to take action. Some great plans were already in progress, while other ideas were derived from small round table activities and group work.

The 2025 Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) was built as a user-friendly guide, inviting every corner of Dickinson County - businesses, healthcare, schools, nonprofits, local government, law enforcement and first responders, and even individual residents, to engage in solutions that fit their strengths. By working across sectors, we can build momentum, foster innovation, and make measurable progress toward a healthier Dickinson County.

The work begins here and now, with the CHIP Guidebook designed to empower anyone and everyone to make a difference over the next three years!

What is a Community Health Needs Assessment?

A Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) is a process for identifying and prioritizing the health needs of a community. It involves collecting and analyzing data, identifying resources. The results can then be used to develop a plan to address the community health initiatives.

Purpose:

To understand the health status of a community To identify the needs and gaps in health care To develop a plan to improve community health To increase access to needed care

Who requires the Community Health Needs Assessment?

The IRS requires that "hospital organizations" defined by 501(r) to include:

- 1 organizations that operate one or more state-licensed hospital facilities, and
 - 2 any other organization that the Treasury Secretary determines is providing hospital care as its principle function or basis for exemption.

When is the Community Health Needs Assessment performed?

"Hospital organizations" that fit the definition described above are required to conduct a community health needs assessment (CHNA) every three years. Following the assessment a Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) is developed to meet the needs community health needs. The CHNA and CHIP should be made available to the public before the start of the next fiscal year.



About Memorial Health System

Memorial Hospital has provided healthcare to residents in Dickinson County since 1922. Over time, the hospital became a health system with a holistic approach, incorporating several health care services for all stages of life. Memorial Health System encompasses Memorial Hospital and its affiliates, Heartland Health Care Clinic, Home Health and Hospice of Dickinson County, Impact Sports and Fitness, Village Manor of Heritage Village, and Frontier Estates of Heritage Village.

In January of 2022, Memorial Health System joined Salina Regional Health Center, becoming its third affiliated hospital after Lindsborg and Concordia to create a larger team of hospitals providing healthcare for patients in the north-central region of Kansas.

Memorial Hospital is a modern and well equipped 25-bed critical access hospital in Abilene, Kansas offering 24-hour emergency care; skilled nursing; nutritional and diabetic counseling, diagnostic laboratory services; diagnostic radiology and imaging services; rehabilitation services including physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy, and sports medicine; respiratory therapy, cardiac rehabilitation, and pulmonary rehabilitation; outpatient geriatric behavioral health services, inpatient and outpatient surgical services, and an array of visiting specialist who provide convenient care in Abilene for patients in Dickinson County. To gain a comprehensive understanding of health trends and risk factors affecting Dickinson County, it is important to incorporate significant health data gathered from a variety of sources, including a county-wide survey that allows residents to provide valuable feedback regarding the community they live in and their accessibility to healthcare.

The CHNA committee met on two separate occasions to create a survey for all community members of Dickinson County. MHS and community partners have a great responsibility to improve the health of their community, and that is done through the healthcare services that they can provide. Although all priorities identified in the community can lead to poor health outcomes if not addressed, MHS and its community partners who provide health care services can not address what is not in their scope of operations. With that in mind, the CHNA committee carefully created a survey to get the appropriate feedback needed to make necessary changes and improvements. The survey was constructed of 43 questions. It was delivered to Dickinson County residents on December 20, 2024 and was open until February 14, 2025.






Q12: Does your household have convenient




Q13: Does your household have convenient access to transportation?




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




Q15: How would you rate your health?




Q16: Please identify the health issues that are directly affecting your household at the time you are completing this survey.







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




Q19: When you need health care, where do you go for these services?









Q22: If you answered yes, please check the following reasons that kept you from receiving medical care that you needed.










Q26: In the last year, was there a time you needed dental care, but you were unable to get it?







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




Q28: When you need eye care, where do you go for these services?




Q29: In the last year, was there a time you needed eye care, but you were unable to get it?





Q30: If you answered yes, please check the following reasons that kept you from receiving the eye care that you needed.




Q31: When you need mental health services, where do you go for these services?



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





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








Q37: In a typical week how are your meals prepared?

CHNA Town Hall Meeting

Date --- April 23, 2025

Time --- 8:00 to 1:00pm

The purpose of the Town Hall meeting was to review the 2025 CHNA survey results, analyze relevant secondary data, identify the most pressing health priorities for Dickinson County, and begin forming a collaborative action plan for the next three years.

Attendees were seated at 10 round tables with 3 to 5 individuals per table, intentionally arranged to mix sectors and perspectives. This design encouraged cross-sector collaboration, innovative thinking, and the opportunity for attendees to learn from one another.

After reviewing the CHNA survey findings and engaging in open discussion about health-related trends and challenges within their sectors, the focus group collectively identified five key health priorities for Dickinson County: Mental Health, Chronic Illness, Substance Abuse, Physical Health, and Insurance.

Next, the round table session was initiated. Each table chose one of the five priorities to focus on, giving extensive consideration to:

- Current efforts within their sectors that are currently addressing the issue
- Opportunities for collaboration
- New ideas and possible action steps for future improvement

When the group reconvened, each table shared its findings and ideas with all Focus Group attendees, creating a rich and inspiring exchange of solutions and strategies.

The meeting was a major success, both in pinpointing the top health priorities for Dickinson County and in generating enthusiastic dialogue and actionable feedback. As the CHNA committee reviewed the ideas and feedback that came out of the event, one thing became clear: so much good work is already happening across Dickinson County. Rather than start from scratch, the committee chose to build on this momentum.

As a result, the Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) evolved into a comprehensive guidebook, a user-friendly, actionable resource that outlines current initiatives, identifies gaps, and offers a menu of strategies for continued progress. The guidebook is designed to:

- Help community organizations and partners align their efforts
- Provide clear, adaptable goals across sectors
- Encourage sustainable collaboration
- Serve as a practical tool for ongoing health improvement efforts
- Allow feedback over the next three years to keep everyone informed on efforts

This approach ensures that the work started at the Town Hall meeting continues in the months and years ahead, empowering stakeholders across Dickinson County to work together toward a healthier future!

Mental Health

What It Is:

Mental health refers to a person's emotional, psychological, and social well-being. It influences how we think, feel, and act, and affects how we handle stress, relate to others, and make choices.

How It Affects Individuals:

Poor mental health can lead to anxiety, depression, substance abuse, and suicide. It can also affect physical health, sleep, relationships, job performance, and overall quality of life. When left untreated, mental health issues often become more severe and harder to manage.

How It Affects the Community:

Communities with high levels of untreated mental illness may experience increased crime, homelessness, school dropout rates, and unemployment. When residents struggle with mental health, it puts added pressure on local law enforcement, healthcare systems, schools, and social services.

Kansas Mental Health Trends (2022-2025):

Unmet Need for Mental Health Providers: As of March 2023, Kansas meets only 26% of its mental health provider need, slightly below the national average of 27.7%.

Increased Poor Mental Health Days: County-based models reflect concerning trends in poor mental health days, especially in rural areas like Dickinson County.

Post-COVID Rise in Anxiety and Depression: By early 2023, over 30% of U.S. adults reported anxiety or depressive symptoms. More than 20% of those affected in Kansas reported needing, but not receiving, mental health counseling.

Slow Development in Mental Health Infrastructure: Kansas has committed to reopening and constructing psychiatric facilities, including a 30-bed unit in Larned and a new hospital in Wichita.

Innovative Rural Mental Health Models: The "LandLogic Model," introduced in 2025, trains providers to connect therapy with rural values and metaphors, particularly for Kansas farmers.

<u>Dickinson County - Specific Insights:</u>

Hospital Admissions for Mental/Behavioral Health (2018–2020): Rate of 72.8 per 10,000 (KDHE).

Depressive Disorder Diagnoses (2021): 41.8% of obese adults and 23.7% of non-obese adults reported ever being diagnosed with depression.

Behavioral and Mental Health Readiness (2022 CHNA): 39.4% rated mental and behavioral health services as "poor" or "very poor," slightly above the state average.



Mental Health cont.

Key changes since the previous CHNA:

Stable but Insufficient Provider Access – Despite incremental improvements, provider shortages remain a critical issue.

Persistent High Mental Distress – No marked decline in poor mental health days has been seen, especially in rural areas.

Growing Awareness and Innovative Solutions – Community recognition has increased, alongside new models like LandLogic.

Admission Rates Worsening – Historical data shows high hospital admission rates for psychiatric reasons in Dickinson County.

Implications:

Provider Gaps Remain a Barrier: Only ~26% of statewide need is met; expansion of telehealth and provider training is vital.

Community Perception Rates are High: Nearly 40% of residents perceive mental health services as inadequate.

Leverage Local Successes: Pilot models like LandLogic in Dickinson's agricultural population could be promising.

Focus Beyond Treatment: Early intervention and integrated community-level prevention are key.



Chronic Illness

What It Is:

Chronic illnesses are long-term health conditions such as heart disease, diabetes, asthma, and obesity. These conditions usually persist for a year or more, and require ongoing medical attention, limit daily living activities, or both.

How It Affects Individuals:

Chronic diseases can significantly reduce quality of life. They may lead to pain, disability, increased medical costs, and shortened life expectancy. Managing a chronic condition often requires lifestyle changes and continuous care, which can be physically, mentally, and financially draining.

How It Affects the Community:

High rates of chronic illness increase the burden on hospitals, clinics, and public health resources. It can affect workforce productivity, raise local healthcare costs, and widen health disparities, especially in rural areas where access to preventive care is limited.

Kansas Trends (2020-2022):

Heart disease mortality rose to 170.4 per 100,000 (above the national average of 168.5). Diabetes mortality increased to 26.6 per 100,000.

Modest reductions in other chronic diseases were observed.

<u>Dickinson County Insights:</u>

38.7% adult obesity (2022).

30.6% physically inactive; 18.7% smokers; 21.3% excessive drinkers (2021).

Heart disease and cancer mortality rates are above state averages.

Key changes since the previous CHNA:

Increased mortality rates for diabetes and heart disease.

Lifestyle risk factors like inactivity and obesity persist.

Preventive programs have expanded, but gaps remain.

Disparities in outcomes continue among rural and underserved populations.

Implications:

Strengthen community-level prevention.

Increase chronic care coordination and outreach in rural populations.



Substance Abuse

What It Is:

Substance abuse refers to the misuse of alcohol, prescription medications, or illegal drugs. It includes addiction, dependency, and risky behaviors related to substance use.

How It Affects Individuals:

Substance abuse can impair judgment, increase the risk of accidents, damage organs, and lead to mental illness, overdose, or death. It also often causes strained relationships, financial instability, and difficulty maintaining employment or education.

How It Affects the Community:

Substance abuse impacts public safety, healthcare costs, crime rates, and child welfare. It can overwhelm emergency services, lead to increased incarceration rates, and break down the social fabric of neighborhoods and families.

Kansas Trends (2019-2021):

Opioid overdose deaths rose 73.5% (2011–2020).

From Jan-Jun 2021, overdose deaths up 54%.

Youth misuse rate: 7.1%; adult SUD: 17.1%.

Kansas saw a 43% increase in overdose deaths in 2021.

Dickinson County Insights:

No county-specific data is publicly available.

Rural overdose trends suggest an increasing risk.

Key changes since the previous CHNA:

Overdose deaths sharply increased, particularly involving fentanyl.

Youth prevention efforts expanded, but challenges remain.

Growth in recovery and peer support services.

The lack of updated overdose prevention policies remains a gap.

Implications:

Increase access to detox, recovery, and harm-reduction services.

Launch public awareness campaigns; advocate for Good Samaritan laws.



Physical Health

What It Is:

Physical health refers to maintaining a healthy body through regular exercise, good nutrition, and avoiding harmful habits. It involves movement, healthy eating, and routine medical care to prevent disease and promote well-being.

How It Affects Individuals:

A physically active lifestyle and balanced diet can reduce the risk of chronic illness, improve energy, support mental health, and increase life expectancy. Conversely, poor physical health can lead to fatigue, disease, and long-term disability.

How It Affects the Community:

Communities with poor physical health may see increased obesity, chronic disease rates, and healthcare expenses. This can limit the workforce and decrease overall quality of life. Promoting healthy habits can lead to longer, more productive lives and reduced medical costs for all.

Kansas Trends:

Diet and activity disparities persist, especially in rural areas.

Rural smoking and inactivity rates are higher than their urban counterparts.

<u>Dickinson County Insights:</u>

52.9% have access to exercise opportunities (vs. state avg of 73.3%).

13.3% food insecurity; 5.0% lack access to healthy food outlets.

Obesity and inactivity remain high.

Key changes since the previous CHNA:

Obesity and inactivity rates remain steady or rising.

Food access initiatives are slowly expanding.

Improvements to built environments are underway.

Community wellness partnerships are beginning to emerge.

Implications:

Expand access to recreation and fresh foods.

Promote walking groups, school programs, and public fitness events.



Insurance

What It Is:

This priority refers to whether individuals have health insurance and can get the medical care they need, when they need it. Access to care includes physical access, affordability, provider availability, and care that is culturally appropriate.

How It Affects Individuals:

Without insurance or accessible care, people often delay or avoid medical treatment. This can lead to undiagnosed conditions, unmanaged chronic diseases, and more severe health problems down the road. Financial stress from medical bills can also affect mental and emotional well-being.

How It Affects the Community:

Limited access to care can lead to worse overall health outcomes, higher emergency room usage, and health disparities. It strains hospitals, reduces productivity, and leaves gaps in community wellness that affect everyone, not just the uninsured.

Kansas Overview:

Rural communities face high provider shortages and hospital closures.

5.1 providers per 10,000 in rural vs. 8.0 in urban.

Medicaid expansion remains stalled.

Dickinson County Insights:

1 primary care provider per 2,052 people.

11.0% uninsured (2019); preventable hospital stays are higher than the state norm.

Transportation and navigation barriers are noted.

Key changes since the previous CHNA:

Provider shortages persist across rural Kansas.

Kansas has not expanded Medicaid.

Telehealth access increased, but digital divides remain.

Navigation services have grown but remain under-resourced.

Implications:

Improve telehealth access and transport options.

Expand health literacy, navigators, and financial assistance awareness.






